Editorial - After FUGE - what is going to happen?

The FUGE program was established by the Research Council of Norway (RCN) after a combined initiative by the university communities. A major focus of the program has been the establishment of technology platforms and networks. Now that these are in place, a more research / problem-oriented approach may be chosen for the future. In autumn 2009, RCN invited researchers to suggest strategies on how further investments in biotechnology should be undertaken – currently called Biotek 2012. Many contributions were received. At the moment the contributions are processed before RCN start their dialogue with policy makers. Step by step the program will be outlined.

A central theme being discussed is: Can we assume that a novel commitment within biotechnology will be able to take over the rate of returns from the research fund as FUGE has had every year? The question is fundamental to the question whether we may assume that politicians acknowledge the general importance of biotechnology research, whether it's about green environment or human illness. If the motivation/insight of politicians is less, it would be better if researchers in Norway could agree on some broad selected thematic headings. If they are carefully chosen, political affiliation may be envisaged. Selected topics should of course be consistent with the goals set in Stortingsmelding No. 30: Climate for research.

Others will argue that we should not go into the discussion of topics in biotechnology, but rather concentrate on describing the quality of research, networking and international contacts. Such qualities are also included in the future goals mentioned in Stortingsmelding No. 30.

We are at a crossroad. Important processes will take place during the next months. Will it be possible for Norwegian researchers to agree on some broad themes defined in biotechnology to ensure solid political commitment? It must involve issues that are socially important and have appeal to politicians. Or, may this approach be too controversial? It is easier for us scientists to agree on quality and network matters, but I doubt that it will work as an inspiration for standard politicians.

Council mediation award in 2008.
