



# How to import references from Oria

**!** Make a back up of your EndNote library before doing major changes or imports to EndNote!

## How to import single references:




EndNote will now only list the imported references. Journal articles are usually imported correctly. Books and reports also, but should be checked for occasional errors. Errors or missing data can be updated later.


