

## How to import references from Medline (EBSCO)

### Importing a single reference:

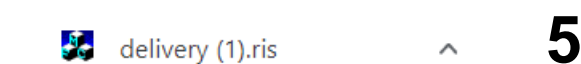
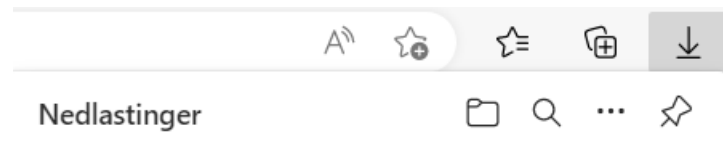
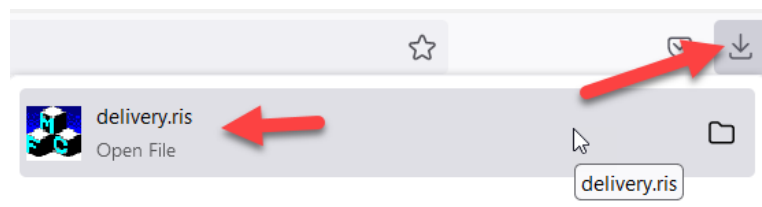

Click "**Export**" (1) in the right menu to import a single reference. Choose the option for direct export to EndNote (2).

Finish with "**Save**" (3).

The export file will usually be saved by the browser, and you need to get it opened for the references to be imported to EndNote.

Examples below show Chrome, Edge and Mozilla Firefox.



**Mozilla Firefox:** Click on export file (open) to get the references imported to your library (4).

**Google Chrome:** Click on export file (open) to get the references imported to your library (5).

**Internet Edge:** Click on “**Open File**” to get the references imported to your library (6).

**Safari (Mac):** Export file will be downloaded and available in Finder. Click on import file in Finder and drag it over the EndNote icon in the bottom of your screen. The references will now be imported to your library.

EndNote will now only list the imported references. We recommend that you check a couple of references to see that the import was correct.

Click on “**All references**” in the left pane to see all references in the library.

Choose "**Direct Export in RIS format.....**" **(8)** and finish with "**Save**" **(9)**. Tick **(10)** if you want to empty the folder after the export file is created.

The export file will usually be saved by the browser, and you need to get it opened for the references to be imported to EndNote. See page 2 for examples.

EndNote will now only list the imported references. We recommend that you check a couple of references to see that the import was correct.

Click on "**All references**" in the left pane to see all references in the library.

## Importing a complete search result:

It is possible to create an import file (RIS-format) with all references that will be sent to you with an email. Depending on the number of references, this may take some time.

You will receive an email with a zipped file attached. Download this file and unpack the RIS-file. Right click the file and choose to open it. The references will now be imported into your library.
