University College London.**

We are living in turbulent times, with urgent need to address social inequities in health and wellbeing that are even worsened in the aftermath of COVID 19, geopolitical instability and the cost-of-living crisis. More than ever, students and faculty staff need to become aware of the drivers of inequity and the solution space to tackle it to promote social sustainability.

NTNU WellFare, CHAIN and Center for Health Promotion Research are honored to offer a guest lecture with professor Professor Peter Goldblatt on the topic ***Inequalities in health and wellbeing and their social determinants: some international comparisons and recommended actions.***

Professor Goldblatt is a world leading researcher on health equity and a Senior Advisor at Institute of health equity, University College London. He has contributed to inspire our centers and NTNU faculty members with his groundbreaking contributions together with the UCL Marmot team at the UCL Institute of Health Equity.

Goldblatt is one of the key authors of the report “Rapid review of inequalities in health and wellbeing in Norway since 2014”. The report will be launched and handed over to Ingvild Kjerkol, Minister of health and care, on a [seminar in Trondheim 10th of March.](#)



As well as his role in the Institute of Health Equity, Peter Goldblatt is a statistical advisor to the UK Department of Health and Social Care and an expert advisor to WHO European Office. His main activities are in the field of measurement and monitoring and contributing to European and other international project to review and monitor the social determinants of health. He was previously the Chief Medical Statistician at the UK Office for National Statistics (ONS). He was seconded from ONS to UCL for the duration of the Strategic Review of Health Inequalities in England post-2010 (the Marmot Review). Following this review, he co-ordinated reviews of health inequalities in the WHO

European Region, for WHO, and a review of health inequalities in Europe, for the European Commission (EC). He has subsequently contributed to several other projects, including European Parliament pilot projects, an EC project on drivers of health inequality, a UNDP project on inequalities in health and its determinants, a review of equity and health inequalities in the Americas, a review of 10 years on since the Marmot Review, a review of non-communicable diseases in Belgium, reviews of health inequalities in Norway and in local areas in England and several projects on the unequal impact of COVID-19 and its containment measures.
