

Articles and new taxa dealing with scorpions authored by Dr. Gershom Levy (1937-2009)

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In the March issue of "The Scorpion Files Newsblog" (<http://scorpion-files.blogspot.com/>), editor Jan Ove Rein has paid some attention to the sudden death of Dr. Gershom Levy, a specialist on spiders and scorpions in Israel.

Gershom, or "Gerele" as he was known among friends and colleagues, was born in 1937 in Tel Aviv, but his parents moved to Jerusalem in 1943, which remained his residence for the rest of his life. He finished high school in 1955, followed by a M.Sc. in Zoology, Chemistry and Parasitology at the Hebrew University in 1964, where he also received his Ph.D. in 1969. His thesis was dealing with "The biology and colour change in *Thomisus onustus* and the systematics of the Thomisidae (Aranea) of Israel". It was not his first paper on Arachnids, but from that moment all his scientific writings were dealing with either Aranea or Scorpiones. Almost each year one or more revisions of certain groups of Arachnids living in Israel were published by him.

As a matter of fact only in very rare cases he was dealing with material from outside Israel. One particular event that comes to my mind that he "handled" scorpions from farther away happened about ten years ago, when some were encountered in the consular premises of Israel in Italy. Only after a lot of outside pressure he agreed, although reluctantly, to identify them. Fortunately they turned out to be a more or less harmless species.

Gershon was also very much interested in art. If he had "discovered" a local painter then he liked to know everything about him. One of his favourites was also the Dutch graphic artist Escher. However, one aspect of his interest in art brings us back to the scorpions: the use of (part of) scorpions as an anti-semitic symbol in medieval paintings. Although he could talk for hours about that subject, he never wrote down his observations.

When Gershon was diagnosed as suffering from cancer of the pancreas, he passed away within a relatively short time on 21 March 2009. With him we lost not only the foremost specialist in the field of spiders and scorpions in the Levant in general and in Israel in particular, but also a highly esteemed colleague and good friend.
